Simple 4-Patches from 5" Squares

Note: This method results in 2 matching 4 patches. Finished 4 patches will measure 4 1/2 inches.

- 1. Pick two 5" squares, typically 1 light square and 1 dark square.
- 2. Place squares right sides together and sew $\frac{1}{4}$ " from the edge of the right side of the paired squares and then sew $\frac{1}{4}$ " away from the left edge of the paired squares.
- 3. Place the sewn squares on the cutting surface with the sewn edges running vertically. Line up the 2 ½" line on your ruler with the <u>edge of the fabrics</u> and cut the squares in half.
- 4. Press the halves open, pressing the seam toward the darker fabric.
- 5. Place the halves right sides together matching up the seam line with the light fabric facing the dark fabric. Nestle the seams. Place a pin at each side of the seam to prevent slipping while sewing the next step.
- 6. Sew down both sides using a ¼" seam, removing each pin so you don't hit it.
- Place the sewn squares on the cutting surface with the sewn edges running vertically. Line up the 2 ½" line on your ruler with the <u>edge of the fabric</u> and cut the squares in half.
- 8. Open the squares, twirl the center seam to reduce bulk, and press. You now have 2 perfectly matched 4 patches.

To twirl the seams:

Pick out the 2 - 3 stitches that are in the seam allowance of the short seam. Looking at the wrong side of the block, gently open it. That center seam should start to twirl itself – just help it with your fingers or an iron.
